# **Transitioning**

"For out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaks. A good person out of the good treasure of their heart brings forth good things, and an evil person out of the evil treasure brings forth evil things."

Matthew 12:34a-35

I love the simple yet profound nature of the logic Jesus presents in every situation. In these particular verses, Jesus is offering his summary judgment against the charge that he heals people by the power of Satan and ultimately lands on the wisdom of "words matter." On its face, it seems like we might be headed for a conversation about "good" people and "bad" people—the nature and character of what this means, judgment, etc.—but the thing I am interested in looking at is the middle, the in-between, or the transition, if you will.

The easy thing to do when your primary source of knowledge is popular culture or years of accumulated personal experience is to look at these words of Jesus and draw the binary conclusion that there is no middle ground, or that all of us fall into the "good" or "bad" category. I suppose this would be a legitimate conclusion, if you take out of the equation our Redeemer, who not only speaks but performs a miraculous healing for anyone who will come to Him and accept it by faith. The very fact that He says in Mark 2:17, "Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick," points squarely to the reality of transition from one pole toward the other.

So I guess it begs the question, "How do you do that? How does one move from one pole to the other?"

This is by no means an exhaustive list but only some of the foundational pieces for negotiating the process of transition:

- 1) Examine the well Jesus could have said any number of things, but he rooted the process in a determination and understanding of what fills our hearts. The reality is that what spills out is only a reflection of what fills up.
- 2) Necessary endings Henry Cloud writes clearly on this issue and offers some helpful insights. In terms of transition, the immutable fact is that there are always things I have to draw a loop around in order to make room so that new things take root.
- 3) Find the bright spots This is a recognition of the sovereign free grace of God that is at work in every human life without regard to our personal relationship with Christ. Even the worst do something good, which bears witness to the sheer gratuity of His grace and not our inherent goodness. Relating this to transition, these bright spots can serve to highlight the gains God is orchestrating for us in the process, and above all else, it is clear evidence of the hope of the gospel.
- 4) Aim small, miss small Transition hinges on knowing where you are going. This underscores the value of a clear, well-defined goal for the transition process. For those of us connected to the kingdom of God, our goal is the complete restoration of the Image of God, which began with putting our trust in Jesus Christ by faith. Our conversion continues on in growing toward loving God with our whole self and loving people as completely as Christ loves us.



I submit to you that in some sense transition is all about moving from sickness to health; it is about discovering who we are and moving toward who it is that God created us to be; and it is about allowing the

good treasure of Christ to fill every nook and cranny of our heart until it spills over into the lives of others in a wave of holy love. Transition then is a healthy movement from what *is* toward "a new heaven and a new earth, for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away." *Revelation 21:1*
